N the early 1990s, a young member of the Beastie Boys, Adam Horovitz (right) — also known as Ad-Rock — and his then-wife, actress Ione Skye, called this West Village co-op home. They lived at this 290 W. 11th St. spread until their separation in 1995. Many of the Beastie Boys' songs were written in the 'hood during this time period, the current listing notes.
